Meetings with Ministers

On 14 October, Craig and Wayne, together with QTI, met with the Minister of Immigration, Michael Wood, to discuss concerns around student visa policy, including post-study work rights (PSWR) for sub-degree level student and for students who do their first year of a degree offshore or with a different provider, the pathway visa, and the disconnect between some immigration and education policy. We put forward some possible proposals for him to consider.

The ITENZ board and Wayne also met with Minister Hipkins prior to the conference start and raised similar issues. We proposed that we meet with him together with the Minister of Immigration to discuss some of these and he was open to that suggestion. He also agreed, as he went on to say in his conference address, that there was a disconnect between Immigration and Education settings.

We also spent some time discussing the issues around Youth Guarantee funding and foundation level programmes, and youth at risk. We acknowledged the very positive movements in YG funding. These changes, he said, were a result of feedback we had given.

We also raised the issue of the financial viability standards and how they were not fit for purpose, especially for providers with capital investments.



ITENZ Conference

The 2022 ITENZ conference was a great success with 140-odd attendees and 15 exhibitors. We had a great lineup of speakers, an ideal venue and excellent coffee! It was very useful too, to have government agency staff around for the two days to learn more about our sector, to understand some of the issues we face, and to provide members the opportunity to meet them in an informal setting.

The feedback so far has been very positive. Attendees said they really appreciated the opportunity to network after so long and that they found the topics very relevant and useful - 92% have said the conference was very good or excellent.

Our sponsors this year were Ako Aotearoa, The New Zealand Story, Education New Zealand, Canvas, and Learning Works and our thanks go out to them.

The conference was organised by Stuart Challis and the TWZL Events team, who did a fantastic job.



On Day Two, Minister Hipkins gave the keynote address and reiterated the critical role PTEs play in RoVE and highlighted those things we all know are PTE strengths - innovative, nimble and adaptable approaches to meeting the changing needs of the workforce, strong links to employers, and putting learners at the centre of what they do. PTEs, he said, are "a significant and incredibly valuable part of the sector."

He also talked about Government's commitment to get more people onto pathways and into jobs and, in some cases, back into society. There is an "enormous opportunity to do more," he said, and "the door is absolutely open" for PTEs to come to government with ideas.

Congratulations to **Raymond Trancel** from **Etco**, who won the Tribal Group-sponsored Tutor of the Year Award and the Ako Aotearoa-sponsored Supreme Award.

Congratulations, also, to **Jude Robinson**, from **Pacific Coast Technical Institute**, who received the Highly Commended Award for Tutor of the Year.

In the citation for the Supreme Award winner, Raymond was described as "a tutor par excellence, his passion for the sector and for teaching is unparalleled. In addition, he is committed to his own lifelong learning.

"Unusually, perhaps, Raymond left a management role to return to full-time teaching. Results have included the development of Zoom programmes for

His contribution to the wider environment has resulted in other registered electricians considering teaching as a career. Raymond uses innovative assessment approaches and makes changes based on feedback and reflection. "
