Funding determinations, 2025

ITENZ made a comprehensive submission on the 2025 funding determinations and a number of recommendations based on feedback received from members, along with other observations.

VET Reform proposal

By now many of you will have attended in-person or online briefings on the VET reforms. The proposed changes will impact PTEs working in the VET space.

Apart from anything else, we can expect a further extended period of change and disruption. Government will be focusing on managing the financial and structural change in the ITP sector and the standard-setting bodies and PTEs will be expected to adapt, as they always do.

One thing that is not mentioned in these proposals (or during RoVE) is that there is one part of the VET sector that is *not* in need of reform. The PTE sector continues to offer quality provision and produce excellent outcomes for learners and employers, despite the challenging funding conditions and sometimes uneven playing field.

It would be beneficial to everyone for Government to look at how this sector can be better supported.

We have sent all our ITENZ member contacts a summary of the possible impacts of the proposals on PTEs.

The funding changes (Proposal Three) will be welcomed by most campus-based and extramural providers; however, workplace learning providers (WBL) will see a cut.

WBL members stand to be most impacted by the proposed changes, depending on the final model chosen in Proposal Two.

For all providers of vocational qualifications, it will at least affect who you interact with and how you do so when it comes to standard setting, programme approvals, and other activities that are currently under the auspices of WDCs.

Providers in the regions might find that ITPs there have access to uncontested funding to attract international students and other learners to the regions.

Bring any questions you have as this is an opportunity to get clarification on areas about which you (and almost certainly others) are unsure.

The decisions are not a foregone conclusion and it is important that you make your voice heard.

2024 strategic funding

Student visas

Immigration NZ has announced [an increase in student visa fees](#) from 1 October to almost double what they are currently - from \$395 to \$750.

The rationale is that the 'heavily-tax payer-subsidized immigration system' [needs to become self funding](#); however, [Radio NZ reports](#) that the increased fees will bring in far more than is needed to meet INZ costs.

Meanwhile, we continue to try to understand the increasing rate of visa declines for some markets and how these can be improved. We have been advocating for more information on decline letters so that agents, students and providers know where the specific issues are and can improve if they need to. To that end ITENZ and other members of the alliance of international peak bodies will meet with INZ in September for a workshop

on visa application processes and decision making.

To assist students in their visa applications, Education NZ, together with INZ, has produced [a short video guide](#)

Minister Stanford made [a speech to EMA](#) in mid-August and although the focus is on migration and employment, it is a useful read to get some context for visa settings in general.

ITENZ at the NZ International Education Conference
